WILLIAM SOWERS



The school year 1937-38 has been an exceptionally good year for the Student Association. To begin with, the enrollment was the largest in the history of the institution. Into this group, some five hundred strong, pour a good portion of well-guided enthusiasm and the feeling of success that was held over from last year and the reason for the record-breaking happenings of the present year will be evident.

Speaking of campaigns, the *Student Movement* campaign this year had a real story-book finish. The excellent leadership of Allan Buller, Lucille Haagensen, and Phillip Moores, backed up by hard work by the entire student body, created a list of nearly twenty-eight hundred subscribers. Record! Yes, a record for this school, and we believe, the record for any of our schools.

We are justly proud of our new library. Members of the Student Association gave \$2000 to the library fund. When we study in the large reading room or search our choice news items in the magazine room, we feel at home because we had such a definite part in its building.

Our latest project, a recreation square, will provide ample facilities for both summer and winter out-door recreational needs. At a recent chapel session the student body answered the call for needed funds to the extent that work will begin immediately and will continue until the square is completed. This square will consist of a concrete court one hundred and twenty feet by ninety feet that can be used for tennis, rollerskating, shuffleboard, and like games. During the ice-skating season it will be flooded. One grass court, sixty feet by ninety feet, will care for volleyball. The entire square will be fenced and lighted, giving us a recreational center of which we can be proud.

It is thrilling to look back to the accomplishments of the past, but if we would progress we must turn about and face the future with the same determination and zeal that has made our past so glorious. Doing this, we need never fear what our end shall be.



The Student Movement

The Student Movement reached a new high this year. Under the campaign fire of Captain Lucille Haagensen and General Philip Moores, enthusiasm mounted to a high pitch. Our Circulation Manager, Allan Buller, was able to count his job well done when the announcement of an all-time record of 2,560 paid subscriptions marked the climax the final night of the Student Movement campaign. Even yet the triumphant shouts of the dough boys ring in the memories of newly determined sailorettes. It was a great campaign.

The editorial staff took up its work under the double advantage of capable editorship and adequate financial support. Mr. Leonard Nelson, who took over the editorship the second semester of last year, has worked untiringly at his job until his resignation from the *Student Movement* staff to edit for the Senior Class this year's annual. Unhampered by inadequate funds, he was able to put out a school paper which ranks high with our denominational school papers.

To Miss Hoover, the faculty adviser, a word of appreciation is due for her efforts in making the *Student Movement* what it is. The business staff has done careful and efficient work. We also appreciate the genuine interest and helpful suggestions of the College Press.

As a supplement to the *Student Movement*, a mimeographed campus sheet, the *E. M. See-er*, made its appearance. Edited the first semester by the members of the journalism class, it has since been making its bi-monthly alternation with the *Student Movement* under the editorial guidance of Alice Love and Harold May. It has successfully answered the need for the presentation of campus news and problems which are of more direct interest to those on the campus. The *E. M. See-er*, published at no additional cost to the resident students, met with instant and continued approval.

The almost unbelievable sacrifice of time, and the willing cooperation of both staffs have been a constant pleasure both to Mr. Nelson and the present editor. With the continued support of the student body and the good will of our 2800 readers, the *Student Movement* cannot fail to reach the high goal set for our denominational school papers.



Prospective Teachers

The crowning experience for the prospective teacher comes at the time when he begins actual teaching. Frequently a teacher enters upon his duties with misgivings and with no little anxiety, for ahead of him lies a great unknown. At Berrien College the prospective teacher has opportunity to enter gradually upon classroom duties by first participating in regular school activities under the general supervision of the director of student teaching and under the more specific direction of the grade or subject supervisor and critic teacher, and later he assumes full teaching responsibilities. By following a plan of this kind the student teacher leaves his college not only with training in subject matter, and theories of teaching, but with some actual experience. Opportunities are available for those who meet the prerequisites to teach in either the elementary or the secondary school or both. These schools are located on the campus and are maintained specifically as laboratory schools. The staff of supervisors is well trained and each is anxious to help the student prepare for "the nicest work ever assumed by men and women."



Missionary Volunteer Society

Probably the most outstanding accomplishment of the year has been the change in the time of meeting, which has permitted a greater attendance than heretofore. We have opened our song service one and one-quarter hours before sundown on Sabbath, and have timed our meetings so that the benediction has been said just as the sundown bell rang out the hours of the Sabbath.

Nine missionary bands have gone out from our society each week in addition to the large number of ministerial field workers who lead churches in this locality. The work done by these bands has made it possible for us to be an honor society throughout the entire school year.

Forum


The Girls Forum originated many years ago when the girls of Birch Hall felt the need of education along cultural and ethical lines. To meet this need a club was organized and christened the Forum.
