
# An Education of Cardinal Significance

ost Andrews students are familiar with the cardinal, that big red bird, the university's mascot, showing up during special social or athletic occasions. Cardinal is actually the name of a brilliant red color, and is used for birds, flowers and even a woman's coat of that color. Therefore, the "papal princes," as they are called, those Catholic church leaders who select each new pope and who wear red are also called cardinals. But the real meaning of cardinal has to do with what is most important, such as cardinal points on the compass by which we navigate-north, south, east, west. Or the cardinal numbers we use to count: namely one, two, three. Some speak of cardinal sinsthat would be the worst kind of sins! It is much better to speak of the cardinal virtues, traditionally identified as justice, prudence, fortitude and temperance.

This last point makes me wonder how the word cardinal really relates to Andrews University, and especially to its students. What are these critically important points upon which an Andrews education hinges

(another important meaning of cardinal)? What essential lessons does Andrews University wish for its students to remember, even if all else is forgotten? Here is my list—four cardinal human qualities that encompass our commitment to both faith and learning: Wisdom, courage, grace and humility. They are not discrete human qualities, for they blend into the formation of a whole person, and they come to expression in our entire intellectual life, all our spiritual strivings, and our social living that together make up the whole of a good Christian education.

I trust you have tasted those cardinal values while here, I congratulate the Andrews graduating class of 2010 on your achievements, and I celebrate this institution for its fifty years since becoming Andrews University. It is a cardinal year both for the students and for the university with which you have cast your lot. 
### Cardinal Rule: Community.

Where were you a student missionary? I was a student missionary at Stanborough International School, in Stanborough, England, serving as the boy's dean.




# an experience...




is crucial to the success of our ministry. It helps children experience a Christian lifestyle and learn about the character of God.



# CM RADIO

Since 2006, Andrews University Campus Ministries has been operating its very own radio station with the purpose of providing an outlet for students to share what's most important to them. Located in the middle room nestled in the back of the CM office, the ministry began with just one computer, and has since grown to a five-person operation.

While the station aims to be primarily student-operated and focused, currently a number of programs are pre-produced. Richard Parke, the station manager, explains: "as of right now, we run three or four programs produced by 'Westar Media Group.'" One of the programs that Westar produces is Countdown Magazine. As Parke describes it, "Countdown Magazine is essentially a top twenty countdown of a mixture of Christian hits with interviews of different Christian artists dispersed throughout the countdown."

As of now, CM radio produces an inhouse show entitled "Discovering God's Love" that airs consistently every Friday.

Parke also added that later this month, CM radio will be airing an interview with Jaci Velasquez. However, Parke's goal for the radio station is for it to become a lot more student oriented both in its student involvement and production.



The Fitness Education minor students offered stations such as: flexibility, strengthening with balls and bands as well as a fitness testing station.



and it was such a peaceful moment when


I realized that I was not alone, that all of






# HOWARD PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

What is your favorite feature in the cafeteria? I think my favorite feature would be the World Market, with the stir-fry and pizza.




While you can receive quality PT education at many schools across the nation, there are three very important features built in to Andrews University's entry-level program that set it apart from others.

Every aspect of learning and interaction with peers, faculty, and clinicians is integrated with the desire to serve more than just the physical needs of patients. The Christian philosophy of service and a desire to practice what you preach has led the Physical Therapy Department to build in two more features that make the program unique:

Most professional programs (medicine, law, etc.) operate under a competitive admissions and grading standard, which means that students who enter programs with a high ranking retain that ranking against other students even if they score lower on exams. While this is common, it is difficult to justify within a Christian context and the spirit of cooperation expected of PT professionals in the clinic after graduation.

The DPT program at Andrews was created specifically NOT to be competitive. Class members are encouraged to be supportive and help each other succeed. Students are graded only on their own performance and are not affected by any other student's grades.

Faculty, staff, and students care about each other. The investment of a considerable amount of time, money, and energy goes into a professional education; students of the Andrews University Physical Therapy program know they have a lot of support from their peers and faculty.




porating a unique presentation method. The audience and I could barely control our laughter and surprise. We applauded their daring and execution making the staging truly a funny teaching moment for all.



I would have to say that the central rule of my life and my classroom is—Jesus First. 'Jesus first' is not only about my own personal devotion to Him but it is rudimentary to the pattern of how I approach every task and surely how I interact with my students as well as everyone else. When you were a child, what did you want to be when you grew up? Well, the first thing I remember wanting to be was a cowboy. I wanted a horse, a gun and holster and to eat wild rabbit cooked over an open fire. Clearly I watched too much 'Gunsmoke' when I was young, but that was, in all honesty, my first and great ambition and it lasted a number of years. Secondly, I dreamed of being a performer – a singer and actress on stage. I grew up with six siblings and we were always putting on shows and circus performances.

But at some level—even as a cowboy—music was central in my life. I always wanted to be involved in music. And as a relatively young girl I grew to love Jesus very much and I often would pretend to preach.

## TIPS FOR SUCCESS IN DR. ZORK'S CLASSROOM

Success has several layers. Honesty, intentional effort and genuine respect for other people and ideas are central to my expectations for students. Academic excellence may not always accompany these attributes, but they are the hallmarks of real success none-the-less. Generally, in order to earn an "A" students must be present all the time. They must do all the work assigned and be thoughtful and engaged in the process. I contend that "A" work is earned through careful attention to detail and the comprehension of the deeper meaning and implications of whatever is being taught. At a fundamental level an 'A" student is one who is looks for meaning, finds it and thoughtfully expresses it back in some substantiated and measurable form.



## J.N. ANDREWS HONORS PROGRAM








he J.N. Andrews Honors Program offers a unique take on academics. Experienced Andrews faculty teach all the honors classes, often for several years, giving the Honors curriculum a sense of stability. Our professors use original texts as often as possible, so instead of reading about Homer or John Locke, students will learn what those authors actually wrote. Students will also become familiar with authors they may never even have heard of before such as Soren Kierkegaard and Annie Dillard. In addition, Honors provides an opportunity for undergraduate students to conduct research and present their findings at an annual Poster Session and Thesis Symposium. The program even funds off-campus research conference attendance.

By joining Honors, students become members of a distinctive academic community that encourages them to be more well-rounded individuals. Honors students have the opportunity to participate in both service activities like toy drives and homeless shelter outreach, as well as social activities. The Honors Program has sponsored many cultural outings, including trips to the Chicago Shakespeare Theater, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Joffrey Ballet, Riverdance, and even a Detroit Tigers/Chicago White Sox game. We also put on events like the Agape Feast, a biannual vespers program with amazing food and speakers.

Honors is a close-knit group. Students in the program often take classes with many of the same people throughout their time at Andrews, and because classes tend to be smaller (except Western Heritage-the Honors version of Boot Camp) than general education classes, professors are readily accessible and available. When the Honors program was started by Dr. Merlene Ogden in 1966, its purpose was to provide an environment in which talented students could excel not only intellectually but also socially and spiritually. 


What is your cardinal rule for people at Andrews University? "The people are extremely friendly plus the guys are real gentlemen"


### A NOTE FROM THE EDITOR...
