

Dr. Eva Beatrice Dykes

IN 1921, EVA B. DYKES received a Ph.D. from Radcliffe College, and was the first African American woman to complete the requirements for the degree in the United States. While working for Howard University in 1944, Dr. Dykes accepted a call to become the first professor with a doctorate at Oakwood College. Dykes' down-to-earth spirit, combined with her gracious manner, her intellectual attainment, and her Christian character, made her a great teacher and role model. Though she was small, she was tough, and perhaps to some, she was a difficult teacher. but she was fair.

Administrators from renowned schools across the country tried to lure her away from Oakwood with offers of larger pay, greater benefits, or better working and living conditions. She would reply, "I am on permanent tenure at Oakwood."

She founded the Aeolians in 1946 and gave the choral group its unique name. In 1973, the newly constructed Oakwood University Library was named in her honor.

Dr. Dykes died on October 29, 1986, in Huntsville, Alabama at the age of 93.

CITY OF HUNTSVILLE, ALABAMA PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS Dr. Eva B. Dykes was the first Black female to complete the requirements for the doctoral degree at Radcliffe College; and

WHEREAS in 1944 Dr. Dykes was the first faculty member with a doctorate to be hired at Oakwood, and was instrumental in assisting the college to gain full senior college status by chairing the accreditation committee; and

WHEREAS in during the 1946-47 school year she founded and directed the Aeolians, giving the choir its unique name which has since become synonymous with Oakwood; and

WHEREAS the accomplishments of the Aeolians have brought worldwide recognition to Oakwood and the City of Huntsville; and

WHEREAS the Oakwood University library is named in her honor; and

WHEREAS Dr. Dykes taught for more than 50 years, and in 1980 was made a Professor Emerita; and

WHEREAS during her lifetime of sacrifice and service, Dr. Dykes embodied the values of devotion, excellence, respect, compassion, integrity, and service;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tommy Battle, Mayor of Huntsville, Alabama, do hereby proclaim March 23, 2021, as

and encourage Huntsville and Madison County residents to honor the memory of Dr. Dykes and her contribution to the community.
